The Lawmaking Process

How a bill becomes a law

1) Cabinet Minister has idea for new bill



- Idea explained to cabinet
- Cabinet approves idea
- Lawyers draft bill
- Cabinet committee examines bill
- Cabinet and caucus approve bill

2) 1st Reading in House of Commons

- Bill is introduced to HOC
- Minister gives a short statement of what the bill is intended to do



3) 2nd Reading

Minister gives major speech about bill

HOC debates

 and votes on
 principle of bill



4) Committee work

Bill is sent to committee for

further study

The bill may be amended



5) 3rd Reading in the HOC

- Rather routine
- Maybe some debate and vote



6) Senate

- Once the bill passes through the HOC it goes through a similar process in the Senate
- 3 readings, committee work, debates, and amendments

Senate cont'd

- The Senate can also introduce bills to the HOC
- They can stall bills
- Send them back to HOC for further review
- Senate rarely rejects bill

7) Royal (Formal) Assent

- The Governor General signs the bill on behalf of the Queen
- The bill is now a law!
