This day should be about reflection and recognizing efforts towards reconciliation. As staff and parents/guardians it is important we set the tone for this National Day of Reconciliation. Like Remembrance Day, somber acknowledgment of the loss, but also hope towards a future free of discrimination and inequality. Students will not be in session on Thursday. At Claremont we honour the Indigenous children who were sent away to residential schools by **wearing orange on Wednesday, Sept. 29**.
